What's the Springmont distinction? That's the question we asked ourselves when coming up with the school's new tagline. There is a great scene in Everybody Loves Raymond where mom goes to talk to the math teacher about how her Elementary-age daughter feels about math. The teacher tells mom he doesn't care about those things; he cares only that his students know math. This scene is the antithesis of the distinctive Springmont

Social psychologist Peter Benson identified this distinction as human thriving – it is different from management and control of children, test scores, safety, physical health or athletic rank. Benson spent his life studying the vocabulary of human thriving - fulfillment, joy, kindness, generosity, passion, in love with life, contributor to society, compassion. We see these qualities demonstrated in our alumni, and our parent community does too.

Recently, a parent shared that meeting our impressive alumni when her son was in Primary helped her to "trust in the process". Today he is thriving as an Upper Elementary student.

Benson determined that human thriving requires knowing one's affinity, having three champions and opportunity. Of those researched, 100% understood spark and 66% could identify their spark, but less than half of those had champions and opportunity. This included the smart kids who knew things. This included the kids in great schools. This left 75% of those studied NOT on the path to human thriving. Academics alone is not distinctive.

So, students must know stuff to be prepared for their future, and there's a lot of knowing and understanding going on at Springmont, but our students also love school, thrive and find success because we know innovation comes from the inside. Human thriving comes from the inside. Developing and discovering the spark happens in childhood. Distinction occurs at the intersection of content mastery and the spark, unique to each student. Nurturing both, as one informs the other, creates a distinctive student, easily identified in a crowd. Those distinctive students grow into remarkable alumni and those alumni are going on to change the world.





What's New?

Springmont is always working to enhance the curriculum and school experience for our students. Here are just a few highlights. Come visit us to see the incredible changes we've made!

Technology and Computer Science are a priority for Elementary and Middle School. Hardware has already been increased in Upper Elementary and the Arts. The Computer Science scope for Elementary and Middle School is being expanded in classrooms as well as art and music.

2016-17 was the first school year with a dedicated Outdoor Education Specialist, and it shows on campus. Our animal menagerie has grown to include a new turkey, Franklin, a rabbit, Oscar, and several baby chicks. The edible garden is in bloom thanks to the Garden Party enrichment class and a grant from the Whole Kids Foundation. Landschool activities now include canoeing and fishing, and the students planted an orchard they can tend to and eat from over the coming years.

Phase I of the playground rejuvenation is underway. The concept, Chutes & Ladders, lays out a plan that takes advantage of the natural changes in elevation on our property, providing a series of slides and climbing features as well as other kinetic equipment plus space for imaginative, creative play and quiet time.

The Running Club has been an attractive Enrichment opportunity for several years, and last year Springmont introduced Swim Club. The community enthusiastically responded, asking for more athletics for our older students. The new Physical Education Teacher joining us for 2017-18 will offer 6th – 8th year students the opportunity to participate in a school sports league for basketball and volleyball.

In February 2017, Springmont welcomed Dr. Rob Evans, clinical and organizational psychologist and Executive Director of The Human Relations Service in Wellesley, Massachusetts, to campus to speak with Springmont parents. With lively wit and plain talk, Dr. Evans outlined the key dilemmas parents face as they raise children today and offered concrete suggestions for coping and successful parenting. The event was a big success and administration is working on a Leadership Speaker series for Upper Elementary and Middle School students and parents for 2017-18.
